From Pastor Aleese

"I pray that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ...may give you a spirit of wisdom and revelation as you come to know him, so that, with the

eyes of your heart enlightened, you may know...what is the immeasurable greatness of his power for all who believe..." - Ephesians 1:17-19

On May 13, Kelsey Drake made a public confession of her faith in the Triune God and committed herself to continue living as a disciple of Christ. As a part of our service, we offered this prayer from the book of Ephesians as a blessing for Kelsey. But that morning, we also recognized that each of us are called to tend to our walk with Jesus. It's why we turned to each other and offered this prayer of blessing to each other so that we all might come to know more and more what the immeasurable greatness of God's love and power is for us and for the world.

So, what does that look like? And how might we come to know what God's love is for us and for the world? One way to think about this is to consider various spiritual practices. What's a spiritual practice? Simply, a spiritual practice is A) something that connects us to God and B) something that we practice on a regular basis.

This summer, you all have an opportunity to commit yourself to a spiritual practice that we're embarking on as a congregation. We say repeatedly that Scripture is the place where we ground our faith. And, as a congregation in the midst of a listening and visioning process under the theme "Grounded in Christ, Sent in Mission" (check out the new large bulletin board coming soon in the narthex for more information!), we have committed ourselves to grounding ourselves in our identity in Christ. Put those

two things together and it seems as though there might be no better way for us to ground ourselves in God's promises than diving into God's Word this summer. I therefore invite you to participate with us as we make our way through the Bible this summer. You can join us in three different ways:

- 1. <u>Comprehensive Verse-by-Verse Reading Plan</u>: Yep. Every verse.
- 2. <u>Condensed Reading Plan</u>: Is every verse a bit too much? Consider the condensed plan that covers 2-4 chapters of the Bible each day.
- 3. <u>Adult Education</u>: Even if you're not reading along with us during the week, you'll get a survey of the entire Bible by the end of the summer!

Though it might seem as though summer is the worst time to suggest such a practice, there simply is no "good time." Even if you're able to walk with us through a portion of our collective spiritual practice this summer, great. Life will happen. Things will get busy. But what might it look like for you to take up a spiritual practice? Maybe this opportunity isn't the best way for you to connect to God on a regular basis. So be it. Then, what else might be something you could either continue or take up this summer as we continue to ground ourselves in Christ? As you move into summer, consider your walk with Jesus and consider what it might look like for you – and all of us – to come to know more and more the immeasurable greatness of God's power.

Though United Way has been organizing this effort for five years, the program has been offered within the community for much longer under other organizational umbrellas.

This summer, lunch will be served at eight sites around Muscatine. Five of those sites will also serve breakfast. To help engage kids in different activities when away from school, some of these sites will also offer a program/activity following the meal to get kids up and moving.

Current Events is the ELCA:

First Female African-Descent Synod Bishops Elected

On May 5, Patricia Davenport (shown top left) was elected to serve a six-year term as bishop of the Southeastern Pennsylvania Synod. She is the first African -descent woman to be elected as a syn-



od bishop. Less than 24 hours later, the ELCA again made history by electing a second female synod bishop of African descent, Viviane Thomas-Breitfeld (shown bottom right). She was elected to serve a sixyear term as bishop of the South-Central Synod of Wisconsin.

Quoting from Living Lutheran, the magazine of the ELCA, "Some of the most meaningful moments for Davenport and Thomas-Breitfeld in the wake of their elections have been hearing from members, young and old, across the church (and other denominations) about what the actions have meant to them. The bishops-elect reported hearing from not only elders of color in the church—savina, "I'm arateful that I lived long enough to see this happen," or "I couldn't sleep last night"—but also encouraged young seminarians, who have told them, "I'm going to stay here [in the ELCA]. I'm going to continue to press forward...

"Probably the thing that has been most gratifying and most humbling is hearing from my sister-pastors and sisters who are in the call process who have been so emotional about this," Thomas-Breitfeld said. "It gives them a sign of hope. That as they watch me, they can celebrate and say, 'Maybe that can be me, too, one of these days. Maybe things are changing.'"

Just as the church celebrated the ordination of women in 1970, so too do we as the church celebrate the elections of these bishops today. These elections signify a path toward intentional inclusion for all God's people in the ELCA and also point to the ELCA taking one more step to reflect the ethnic make-up of this country. Together with all God's people, we offer our thanks for those who serve as our leaders and pray for the Spirit to continue to move within Christ's church on earth!

Synod Assembly Report

First, thank you to Pastor Aleese who invited Roger Luft and I to be voting members and representatives of Shepherd of the Cross at this year's Southeastern Iowa Synod Assembly. Representing our congregation was an honor for us.

This year's theme was The Water and the Witness. The congregation should be somewhat familiar with this theme as the children (and adults) were diligent in raising funds for clean water for the ELCA World Hunger program.

Some of the major issues and highlights before the assembly were:

- Southeastern Iowa Synod Governance Restructuring
- The Bishop's report
- Talk given by Mikka McCracken, "Pentecost Girl," Director for Planning and Engagement, ELCA World Hunger
- Bishop H. Julian Gordy, Bishop of the Southeastern Synod, Tennessee
- Voting on Churchwide voting members

Southeastern Iowa Synod Governance restructuring is to address the current emphasis on Leadership and Vital Congregations. The changes made are to enhance the shared witness to God's saving action in and through Jesus Christ. Individual members of this congregation will not experience much impact from these changes. It is mostly for church leadership (Synod Council, Synod Deans, Conferences and Conferences Chaplains). There is a handout available if you are interested in learning more about this.

The bishop's report really spoke to me as a voting member. One sentence that perhaps made the most impression on me is, "If your congregation went away, would anyone notice?" In the community or connection to the church down the street? How do we become or remain a "Vital Congregation?" We continually need to try something new, no matter how difficult it is to say "no" to something old. We need to remain communities of Jesus – that life changing relationship with God, with each other. We must continue to proclaim the good news – Jesus Christ!!

One last thought that came from Bishop H. Julian Gordy. He quoted Abe Lincoln. "Do I not destroy my enemies when I make them my friends?"


New Business: No new business


